## WORKSHOP TEACHERS

The following 6-12 teachers work primarily at Hālau Ho'olako assisting students as they rotate through a series of Math, Language Arts and 'Ōlelo Hawai'i workshops.



**Auhea Puhi** has been part of KANU's teaching team since the school opened its doors in 2000. A Kamehameha School graduate, she has a BA in music and participated in the Hālau Wānana Teacher Education Cohort. She also received her Hawaiian Lifestyle Certificate from Hawai'i Community College. Aunty Auhea is an advocate of traditional and contemporary Hawaiian music and directs the annual Kani Ke Ō event.

In 2002, she composed "Nō Kohala He Pa'a Kō Kea," explicitly for KANU. Aunty Auhea is a master feather lei maker who has been practicing the art for over 40 years. Aunty Auhea also instructs KANU's senior class in cultural aspects and traditional values, one of which is designing and creating their own lei hulu or feather lei for their graduation ceremony.

Aunty Auhea also assists students in their Math workshops and 'Ōlelo Hawai'i workshops. Over the years, Aunty Auhea has shared her expertise in working with feathers with audiences from near and far. She has also taught Hawaiian studies and hula in the community, Waimea Elementary and Intermediate, and at KANU and has assisted designing and sewing hula attire for her students. She also continues to practice the art of wrapping pa'ū for various units in parades and Hawai'i on Horseback.



**Betsy Boland** is our Senior Project and College Advisor. This is her third year at Kanu o ka 'Āina. She lives in Waimea with her husband and two sons, ages 14 and 9. Before joining KANU she taught in many different settings in Hawai'i, California, Spain and Switzerland and managed an international exchange program for high school students. She earned her B.A. from the University of California at Davis and her teaching credential from the University of California at Santa Barbara. Aunty Betsy has worked with children of all ages from many different cultures and finds cultural diversity to be the most exciting part of her work. Aunty Betsy loves her work with the seniors because of their desire to expand their worlds after graduation and their focus on refining the skills they'll need for college or a career. She says her current seniors are exceptionally talented, culturally grounded, and very fun to work with!

**Stephanie David-Chapman** grew up in California and graduated from University of California-Santa Cruz in 2006 with a Bachelor's degree in Sociology. She has most recently completed Hālau Wānana, KALO's teacher education program and hopes to earn her Master's Degree from Union Institute and University in Creativity with a focus on Indigenous Education in June.

Stephanie first came to Hawai'i the summer of 2004 on an independent study at the University of Hawai'i at Hilo. After graduation, she moved to O'ahu in 2007 and began working for Kamehameha schools community outreach. She worked there for three years as a literacy specialist, helping K-3<sup>rd</sup> graders in reading and writing through art, music and Hawaiian culture.

This is Aunty Stephanie's first year at KANU. She moved to Waimea with her husband this past summer, just after their wedding. She feels honored and privileged coming to school each day as the students and community of Waimea have welcomed her with open arms. In her spare time she enjoys, surfing, making earrings, writing and art. Aunty Stephanie is a Kumu in Kauhale Project and is also a language arts workshop teacher.

**Keali'i Lilly** assists the Pu'ukapu Project. After moving to Hawai'i from the continent to attend UH Hilo, where he earned a BA in Hawaiian Studies, Uncle Keali'i Lilly was "born again" when he began to farm taro in Waipi'o in the late 1980's. As a former taro farmer and an avid planter, Uncle Keali'i is sold on the idea of sustainability and believes that our island can still feed its people. In the early 1990's, Uncle Keali'i helped to start up our Kukulū Kumuhana Summer camps, which became the forerunner of Kanu o ka 'Āina Hawaiian Academy, where Keali'i started to work in 1997. Overall Uncle Keali'i has been with KANU for eleven years.

He is married to Olani and has four children; Ama, Napahu, Kukuipahu and I'i. Besides helping the Pu'ukapu Project to continue the propagation and landscaping of Kauhale 'Ōiwi o Pu'ukapu, Uncle Keali'i also teaches haumāna from kindergarten through high school to mālama 'āina, as part of our Ho'okauhale after-school and intersession programs. Uncle Keali'i also helps to teach KANU's level 3 and 4 'Ōlelo Hawai'i workshop class.

**Val Hanohano** is one of KANU's founding mothers, a past president of KANU's Local School Board and long-time steadfast supporter of our vision. Originally starting as KANU's site supervisor, Aunty Val has been KANU's in-house graphic designer for nearly a decade. She brings with her a wealth of technology and cultural knowledge not just to the tech team but to our entire 'ohana. Aunty Val teaches Graphic Design to 6-12 haumāna as well as a stone and wood carving workshop called "Ike Hana Lima." On Wednesday afternoons she teaches Beginning Photography to students in grades 5-8 and does a Genealogy workshop with Aunty Erin Lindsey for community members. Aunty Val enjoys poetry, chanting, the outdoors, coaching basketball, spending time with her mo'opuna and seeing the world through the lens of her camera.

**No'eau Lindsey** has lived in Waimea his whole life. He grew up in Kuhio Village, a block away from our new school and has been with our Tech Team since 2002. Uncle No'eau's mother, Aunty Erin is a long-time KALO employee, his younger brother Kaika is a graduate of KANU and younger sister Honu (Gr. 11) has been a KANU student since our start-up. Uncle No'eau handles most tech requests, including setting up technology equipment for events, recording commercials, editing videos and troubleshooting computers. Over the years, No'eau has also taught a variety of tech classes to KANU students, as well as adults from the community. These include Microsoft Excel and video. For the past three years, No'eau has been KANU's Yearbook advisor assisting with the development of KANU's annual Yearbook. No'eau's two daughter's Teighen (Gr. 3) and Harleigh (Gr. 5) attend KANU, and son Kūnaka (age 3) is a prospective future KANU student.

### Transforming Indigenous Education

Over the past three months Kanu o ka 'Āina Learning 'Ohana (KALO, our non-profit support organization) has been outlining initiatives that KALO should pursue over the next decade with a commitment of growing womb-to-tomb models of education that advance Hawaiian culture for a sustainable Hawai'i. These initiatives are intended to strengthen our organization and extend our reach by establishing an autonomous, holistic education system for Native Hawaiians.

Our first initiative has been to restructure KALO's operations and leadership model to create a healthy and sustainable organization. As a result of this initiative we have invited and installed three new members to the KALO Board. They are;

**Hannah Springer** of Kona, who brings to our organization a firm conviction and understanding of our kuleana to treasure the history of our lands and people. She brings great experience having served on numerous boards in the Islands.

**Robert Witt** of Honolulu, who leads the Hawaii Association of Independent Schools and is internationally known among private schools. He brings great experience, leadership and aloha for our islands and people to the Board.

**Robert Lindsey** of Waimea, who is a Keiki o ka 'Āina, retired employee of Bishop Estate and presently on the OHA Board. He brings knowledge of our native lands and the experience of having lived in the Hawaiian community and is an active participant in Hawaiian issues.

We are pleased to have our new Board members join us as we study and discuss the following initiatives listed below.

- Establish public-private financing mechanisms that allow 27 charter schools throughout Hawai'i to pay for upgrades in facilities. Recently, KALO has obtained 1.5 million dollars from OHA to be shared among 17 of Hawai'i's charter schools.
- Force the state of Hawai'i to develop a comprehensive plan for addressing the inequities in educational infrastructure for Native Hawaiians.
- With the Local School Board, expand the new community-designed and controlled facility, Kauhale 'Ōiwi o Pu'ukapu, to fully realize an intergenerational center for culturally driven learning for everyone—womb to tomb.
- Obtain accreditation for Hālau Wānana Indigenous Center for Higher Learning from the World Indigenous Nations Higher Education Consortium, firmly establishing the Hlau Wānana as an international model for teacher training, curriculum development, and research in education for indigenous communities.
- Investigate options and possibly create an autonomous school district made up of public schools across Hawai'i that adopt a comprehensive curriculum known as Education with Aloha.

Dr. Kū Kahakalau, we extend our aloha for your vision, courage and foresight. We honor and respect the legacy you have built for this community and the children who have been blessed by your vision.
